Minutes Floyd County Board of Supervisors Public Hearing July 30, 2024

- 1. Called to Order Chairman Turman called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. or thereafter.
- 2. Opening Prayer The opening prayer was offered by Supervisor Cox.
- 3. Pledge of Allegiance Jenny Tolbert offered the Pledge of Allegiance.
- **4. Quorum** Deputy County Administrator Chiddo called the roll. A quorum was found for Supervisors. Supervisor Kuchenbuch attended the meeting remotely in a secure location
- **5. Approval of Agenda** On a motion by Supervisor Boothe seconded by Supervisor Bechtold and unanimously carried to approve the agenda.
- 6. Public Hearing Request of Road Abandonment State Route 792

Supervisor Turman advised that there will not be a vote on the matter tonight. He reminded everyone to be respectful of the speakers and not interject. He read the Handicap Statement.






Current Public and Abandoned Roads











637 Heading NW to Thomas Farm Road (View from creek crossing)

8. Public Comment

- a. Kathleen Dawe Little River District
 - Ms. Dawe noted the following:
 - She owns 27 acres along this road.
 - Neighbors access their campsite from this section of road.
 - Generations have enjoyed nature on this road and the sound of the river.
 - There has been no damage to her property.
 - Abandonment is permanent and she would like for this area to continue as a place for hiking and outdoor activities.
- b. Tanja Vidovic Little River District

Mrs. Vidovic noted the following:

- She looked forward to the peaceful woods of her property after retirement.
- ATV riders are illegally using the road and trespassing on her property.
- ATV riders use the road daily.
- Riders are causing damage to the property and threatening her.
- She is scared for herself and her children on her property.
- She could put up a gate but fears that would re-route the ATV riders to her home or her neighbor's homes.
- She believes public safety is a concern on this section of the road.
- c. Betty Walker Franklin County

Mrs. Walker noted the following:

- Her family owns property near this section of the road.
- Nolen's Mill had a Post Office, and this route was how people from Franklin
 County came into Floyd.
- Grandmother was born there.
- Her elderly mother visits the property by riding up to the old homestead on an ATV.
- EMS used ATVs for an injured person on this section when she was on the Volunteer Rescue Squad.
- This road was here prior to Shooting Creek Road.
- d. Jerry Greer Rocky Mount
 - Mr. Greer noted the following:
 - He owns property here in Floyd.
 - President of "We Care Franklin County".
 - He has ridden ATVs for entertainment on this section of road for 30+ years.

e. Larry Martin - Franklin County

Mr. Martin noted the following:

- · He owns property here in Floyd.
- Sponsors "We Care Charity Ride" twice a year.
- People come to the organized rides from other states.
- People seek to buy homes in Floyd after being apart of the charity ride.
- They cut trees to clear the path for the riders on the trail.
- They also pick up trash along the trail after the ride.
- Riders get to experience the beauty of nature during these rides.
- He would like to see this tradition continue.

f. Bobby Hurt - Franklin County

Mr. Hurt noted the following:

- Come to Floyd because of the "We Care Ride".
- This type of trail would cost a lot to build.
- Beauty of the trail. Enjoyed by all ages.

g. Dwayne Thompson – Little River District

Mr. Thompson noted the following:

- His grandparents live here.
- Spent summers here as a child and learned the history of this section of the county.
- ATV riders keep the path clear for others.
- Everyone loves the beauty of the property.
- Rides horses here because there are not many places to ride in the county.
- These types of trails are safer for riders than roads.
- Can Floyd build a park for riders to enjoy?
- Necessity for this to remain open due to safety concerns and for leisure purposes.

h. David Elliott – Little River District

- Mr. Elliott noted the following:
- He has lived here for many years.
- He wants to see this section remain open. He would like to walk through this section to experience the beauty.

- People should respect the property owners.
- The trail could have better markers so that people don't go onto other people's property.

i. Seth Phelps - Little River District

Mr. Phelps noted the following:

- He is a lifelong resident of Floyd and obsessed with Floyd County History.
- Has spoken with the neighbors in the area to learn the history of the Runnit Bag community.
- Wants to protect Floyd County history.
- This property represents the culture of Floyd.
- There are no recreational areas in Floyd to learn this type of history and experience these types of activities.

j. Myrin Phelps – Little River District

Myrin Phelps noted the following:

- Writing style is a poet.
- Queer, disabled and 20 years old, and enjoys learning the history of Floyd.
- Wants to learn more about the history of Floyd and the landmarks along this section.
- Recently got to experience the section of the county by riding ATV with father.
- Mobility issues limit access to this property. ATV use helps to access this property.
- Abandoning the road would limit access to people who want to experience the history here.

k. Venda Keith –

Mrs. Keith noted the following:

- She has lived in Floyd her whole life. Her great-great grandparents lived here.
- Used to ride horses in this section.
- Has not ever seen any type of destruction in this section.
- Shared that you don't venture off the trails because of moonshiners or pot growers.
- Hopes that the road remains open.
- Concerned about fires. The road needs to be open so that firefighters can access.

I. Jared Vidovic – Little River District

Mr. Vidovic noted the following:

- Lives at the property that we are discussing.
- Riding ATVs on the designated easement is currently illegal.
- The current path trespasses on three different properties.
- People don't know that they are trespassing because of historical use.
- They have a notice up on their property that if you want access to the cemetery to contact them and they can arrange a time to do so. They would also allow access if the property has historical significance to someone, people just need to ask first.
- There has been littering and property damage and vandalism.
- People have been drinking and leaving bottles on the property.
- ATVs have been spinning circles in the cemetery and tipping over stone markers.
- The current route for the charity ride is trespassing.

m. Jean Lacoste – Little River District

Ms. Lacoste noted the following:

- She supports the road remaining open for historical significance and public safety, to provide access for fire fighters, etc.
- Walked from Laurel Bluff Road to the end of 792 and saw no property damage, cut trees or trash.
- Property owners can post her land and prosecute anyone who trespasses regardless if the road is abandoned or not.
- Most of 792 is on the other side of the creek which is not owned by the petitioner.
- Approximately 600 feet of the petitioner's property adjoins 792.
- n. Eli Wade Waived his right to speak.

o. Joe Bowman -

Mr. Bowman noted the following:

- He has never heard of any issues on Runnitt Bag until now.
- Tampa FL paid out a lot of money for the "common denominator".
- Suggested a restraining order against anyone who would bother the Runnitt Bag travelers.
- p. Woody Crenshaw Little River District

Mr. Crenshaw noted the following:

- Lives on Thomas Farm Road at the intersection.
- Hurricane Hugo blew an enormous tree down causing the access to be restricted.
- Doesn't want to add pressure to open or clear 637 for access should 792 abandoned.

q. Beth Highley - Little River District

Mrs. Highley noted the following:

- She has lived on Runnitt Bag Road with her husband since 1980.
- She has always treated the road as a discontinued road.
- Accepts that the public travels on this road.
- The road on her property has already been abandoned in 1957 making it a private road but she does not plan to use the road any differently.
- In her experience the travelers on this road have been respectful.
- Six times in 44 years they have had trespassers cause damage to property.
- Wants road to remain as a discontinued road to allow the public access to the stunning natural beauty.
- She is on the Board of the Floyd Historical Society Society has done research on this road and its community.
- Anyone who travels this road steps back in time to experience the Runnitt Bag community and lost civilization.

r. Jeff Walker – Little River District

Mr. Walker noted the following:

- He owns a 30 foot right of way that goes to the middle of the road.
- He has had the property surveyed. He joked that GIS stands for "Get It Surveyed".
- Petitioners' property runs along the creek and the road is to the north of the creek.
- Provided maps showing the property lines that he obtained from the courthouse.
- We are gathered because we value our vested rights.
- He is a contractor who has experience with dealing with property owners and right- of – ways
- He uses a right-of-way to access his property with farm equipment.

s. Jesse Slusher - Little River District

Ms. Slusher noted the following:

Two rooms of attendance for this meeting. Important subject.

- Has lived in Floyd 46 years.
- · Owns land along this section.
- · Wanted to protect access to family property.
- · Logging roads on his property have had the occasional trespasser.
- Likes to take his 85-year-old grandmother to the creek on his ATV.
- He is not land locked.
- He supports the road being abandoned.
- t. Kamala Bowers Little River District

Ms. Bowers noted the following:

- This is a tough decision with points on both sides of the discussion.
- As a property owner she would also be unhappy with these situations on her property.
- u. Eli Schwartz-Gralla Locust Grove District

Mr. Schwartz-Gralla noted the following:

- People need to learn the history of the property before purchase.
- Need to respect property owners.
- If County does not abandon the road, then it should be better maintained.
- Annual ride should be preserved.

On a motion by Supervisor Boothe, seconded by Supervisor Cox, the approval was unanimously carried for adjourning the meeting until the next scheduled meeting of 07/30/024 at 8:22 p.m.
